

MRS. G. H. CURRY DIES OF INJURIES; FRIENDS SHOCKED

Highly Beloved and Esteemed
Lady Dies From Wounds Sus-
tained in Auto Accident

The news of the death of Mrs G H Curry Monday evening came as a shock to the city of Richfield, and the entire community felt an unwonted sadness at having lost by an accident such an extraordinarily talented woman, who gave freely of her great gifts whenever called upon for any good cause. Among other services rendered she was county chairman of the Christmas seal sale of the Utah Public Health association. She was on whose life has been an example of cheerful service in all her undertakings, and who, in the short time she has resided in Richfield, has won the esteem and friendship of everyone.

The accident that brought to an end, so untimely, this rich life, happened in Clear Creek canyon Sunday evening. Mr. and Mrs M. D Browder with one of their children, and Mr and Mrs. George H. Curry were returning through the canyon from an outing Sunday evening just when darkness had set in. Mr. Browder was driving and met a wagon without lights attached thereto, and passing this wagon, the driver noticed trailing behind it, a mowing machine. To avoid a collision he turned to the right. The car tipped over, rolled down to the creek and completed a somersault till it was standing on its four wheels again. Besides Mrs Curry all of the occupants of the car were badly shaken up except the child, and especially so was Mrs Browder whose left side was severely bruised and at least one rib fractured.

Mrs Curry was taken to Elsinore where she was put to bed in the home of the Elsinore druggist, Bazil Jensen. Dr Gledhill was immediately called to the bedside of the patient and arrived there about an hour after the accident had happened. He found the collar bone and three ribs broken and one of the ribs penetrating the lung. Mrs Curry suffered intense pains but in spite of them she expressed the wish to be brought to Richfield. A truck was hired and the bed with the patient put on the truck, the tires softened so as to avoid any shock, and with great care the patient was taken to Richfield to the home of Mr and Mrs Browder. Right from the beginning the physicians, Dr J G McQuarne was called into consultation, held little hope for recovery and Monday night shortly after 6 o'clock Mrs Curry closed her eyes forever for the scenes of earth.

Mrs Curry was 57 years of age and a native of England. Mr. Curry and his wife have resided here for the past two years.

The deceased leaves her husband, Geo H Curry of Richfield, and a daughter, Valene Mary Curry of Shanklin, Isle of Wight, England, together with a great circle of friends to deeply mourn her loss.

Funeral services will be held in the First ward chapel Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.
